Children's Colds and Illnesses

While last year's H1N1 Flu scare is mostly behind us, Country Brook Montessori School continues to watch and look out for any news coming its way with regard to illnesses and conditions that affect the health of the children.

If (or when) we become aware of new developments, we will bring you up-to-date as well. No school, including ours, can guarantee that all of its children will remain free of any communicable disease. But we can take every step possible to reduce the risk of spreading illnesses.

One of the biggest and easiest steps to help reduce illness in children is frequent and thorough hand washing with soap and water. This is also a step that can and should be encouraged at home.

Another important step is to limit the exposure of well children to children who are not well. Parents of children who exhibit illness symptoms will be called to pick up their children from school. While we know this is not always easy with parents' busy schedules, it is a necessary safeguard to help slow the spread of illness throughout the school.

For Your Information

Lunches

If your child brings his or her lunch to school...PLEASE take a few minutes to read the information titled Meals in your parent handbook. Remember too, the USDA and the Georgia Dept. of Early Care and Learning have guidelines for all children who have lunch in school/day care facilities that must be met. Please understand this is not just Country Brook Montessori School's policy. It is a state and federal requirement and failure to comply puts the school's license in jeopardy. Students bringing lunches that are not in compliance with state regulations will have their lunches supplemented by the school and parents will be charged for these provisions.

Clothing

Country Brook Montessori School has had a student dress code in place for a number of years. The dress code itself does allow for a variety of clothing choices for the children with some restrictions in regard to color and design. The specifics of the dress code can be found in the parent handbook recently distributed to all families.

All clothing brought to school should be clearly labeled with your child's name. The weather will begin getting cooler (we hope) in the near future. Please check your child's spare clothing regularly to make sure their clothing is appropriate for the weather.

Backpacks

Carpool - Dropping Off / Picking Up Children

Our carpool lane is a help for many, but we all must try and remember basic carpool courtesy. If you arrive before the children have been released to the playground, please park in the nearest parking space. Cars lining up in the carpool lane prior to children being available for pick up creates a backup in the parking lot and prevents others from being able to park.



This is one of the busiest times of day for our staff and it is important to remember that their #1 priority is the safety of the children. To safely and successfully accomplish dismissal in an efficient manner, the teachers CANNOT use this time for even the briefest of one-on-one conferences with parents. Please do not park your cars and approach the teachers to talk about your child's day while they are dismissing other children at carpool. Their class groups require their undivided attention. Arrival and dismissal time also mean there are many children crossing the parking lot after exiting or before entering their vehicles. PLEASE remember to DRIVE SLOWLY. We thank you, and the children thank you!
